

Build a real “piggy” bank

Follow these steps to turn an ordinary plastic bottle into an actual piggy bank. Make sure to ask an adult for help when you need to.

What you need

- A clean plastic bottle with a lid (like a water bottle, juice bottle, etc.)
- Scissors or a craft knife (adult help required!)
- Glue or hot glue
- Paper, construction paper or scrapbook paper
- Markers, stickers or googly eyes
- Craft foam or pipe cleaners
- 4 bottle caps or pieces of cardboard tube for “legs”



Instructions

1. Get your bottle ready

Wash and dry your bottle so it's clean and easy to decorate. Peel off any labels so you have a blank canvas.

2. Make a coin slot

Ask an adult to help you draw a small rectangle on the top of the bottle. With their help, carefully cut along the lines to create your coin slot.

3. Add legs (optional but fun!)

Glue 4 bottle caps or cardboard tube pieces to the bottom of your bottle. This helps your piggy bank stand up straight.

4. Decorate your piggy bank

Now for the fun part: Make your piggy bank yours! Try adding:

- Colorful paper wrapped around the bottle
- Googly eyes for a silly face
- Paper or foam ears
- A pipe cleaner tail (curly or zigzag — you choose!)
- Stickers, patterns, stripes or designs

You can even draw or glue on a picture of something you're saving for (like a game, toy, bike or special outing) to stay motivated!

5. Start saving

Once your piggy bank is dry and decorated, start feeding it coins and bills. Watch your savings grow a little bit each day.

Get creative

Your piggy bank doesn't have to look like a pig. Try making a unicorn, robot, monster, dragon or anything you imagine.
